Early in 1976, Malcolm and I found that something clicked when we played music together. We would sit down to play and soon we would break into broad smiles and beautiful music would be the result. Since that time, we have played together at festivals and schools, but mostly in the bars and restaurants of Cincinnati, Ohio. A couple of the nicest places we have played there are Arnold's Grill and Hap's Irish Pub. We also have played with the Cincinnati Country Dance Orchestra for their weekly contra dancing.

Although I was born in New York City, I was raised since the age of two in Cincinnati. I started playing the piano at the age of four or five and since then haven't been able to stop myself from learning new instruments or new styles of music. I have spent my time playing rock, bluegrass, medieval, renaissance, baroque, classical, contemporary or "new music" and, of course, folk music. Composing has been one of my main interests since I was twelve years old.

Malcolm is one of the country's best hammer dulcimer players as well as a craftsman who builds some of the best hammer dulcimers, including the one you see and hear on this record. He has lived in many places from Colorado to Connecticut, and as a child, he toured Europe singing with the Columbus Boy Choir. He has been playing and building hammer dulcimers for about four years and has developed a beautiful playing style that is unmistakably his own.

To give unity to the record, we have chosen to play traditional instrumental folk music of the British Isles plus a few tunes that we have written ourselves. All of the selections are instrumental with the exception of the first verse of **Christ Child's Lullaby** which Malcolm sings. However, when we perform we do a lot of singing and play traditional American folk music as well.

Two of the medleys that we do on this record, The Three Little Drummers, Kate Caulfield's Jig, Paddy in London, and the three schottisches, are tunes that we learned from a dear friend of ours, Michael J. Kennedy, a 76-year-old melodeon player. (The melodeon is a small button accordian which works, as does the anglo concertina, on the same principle as the harmonica - producing a different pitch when the player changes the direction of the air flow.) Michael was born and raised near Galway, Ireland, and came to Cincinnati at the age of twenty-three to work for the Louisville & Nashville Railroad. He now lives in Covington, Kentucky, just across the Ohio River from Cincinnati. In addition to being a very kind person, he is an excellent melodeon player (he has been playing the melodeon since he was thirteen).

Neither Malcolm nor I grew up with the traditional folk music of the British Isles. We were first introduced to this music while at Oberlin College. We played with many traditional players there and at festivals elsewhere. Our love for this music is shared by many people here and abroad.

We are indebted to the many people from whom we have learned and received encouragement. We hope that this music brings as much joy to you as it brings to us.
